Our popular **Charity Valuation Days** have started with our next Valuation day on Thursday, 23rd March 2017 in aid of **Dyslexia Scotland**.

Dyslexia Scotland is a national charity which aims to inspire and enable people with dyslexia, regardless of age and abilities to reach their potential in education, employment and life. Based in Stirling, they have a network of 19 volunteer-led branches across Scotland as well as 3 Adult Networks. They provide a wide range of high quality support and services to people with dyslexia of all ages as well as those who support them, including parents, teachers and employers. That support includes a national [Helpline](#), assessment, tutoring and employment services, dyslexia awareness training, conferences, road shows, branch and Adult Network meetings, Dyslexia Awareness Week events and membership services including a quarterly magazine. There is a wide range of information and advice freely available on our [website](#) and social media. **Dyslexia Scotland** also influences positive change for people with dyslexia by raising awareness about dyslexia, developing national resources such as a ground breaking free online [Addressing Dyslexia Toolkit](#) for all teachers of children and young people aged 3-18 years and running successful [campaigns](#) to raise awareness and challenge myths about dyslexia.

Thursday, 23rd March 2017 will feature **ANTIQUA PAINTINGS & PRINTS** and our expert, **Malcolm Innes** was, for over thirty years, one of the leading British dealers in Scottish, Sporting and Military pictures - oil paintings, watercolours and pastels. Starting in Chelsea, London in 1973, he opened a Gallery in George Street, Perth for four years 1980-1984. This was moved to Edinburgh beginning in another George Street and changing to Dundas Street in 1995. Meanwhile, the London Gallery transferred to the 'Heart of the Art World' in Bury Street, St. James's.

As Malcolm's retirement approached, the Edinburgh Gallery became the Anthony Wood Gallery and for a further three years the Malcolm Innes Gallery in London merged with, and is now part of, The Tryon Gallery. Malcolm Innes lists museums, corporate and private collections among his clientele. He has had stands at nearly 40 Game Fairs including those at Scone and Moy.

He now lives at Kilspindie, Near Abernyte, and is happy to help owners of pictures on restoration, framing and valuations as well as advising on buying and selling at Auction.

He will be available from 10.30 am to 3pm to give verbal valuations of your paintings. A donation of £2 per item for our Charity, Dyslexia Scotland, will be requested when you arrive at the main desk and register.
